

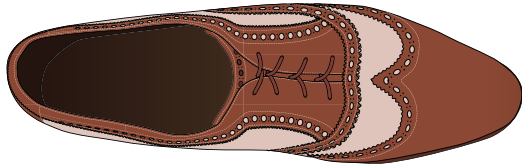

Bespoke Unit's Key Spectator Shoe Facts

- A type of brogue, spectators were popular in the 1920's during the Jazz Age
 - Also known as a "correspondent," especially in Britain

What Makes It A Spectator?



- A spectator is a two-toned brogue, typically with a brown or black heel counter, toe cap, and quarters. The rest of the shoe is often white leather but many colorways are now available
